In December 2012 The YW house in East London was sold - an end of a season ... or so I thought.

After being away from home (the Western Cape) for a long period, I thought it is time to go back. I started to work as administrator for STOP (Stop Trafficking of People), which is an NGO and based in Stellenbosch.

After hosting about 50 pastors from East Africa as a last event at the East London YW, I was invited to Kenya to be part of a Gospel crusade and to speak about Human Trafficking and what role the church has to play. I spend 10 amazing days in Kenya. There were lots of meetings and I met the most wonderful people. At the end of my stay I told my host, Bishop Kamau, that I don't know who or what is the most beautiful in Kenya ... the scenery or the people.

Back in South Africa I liaised with the Hawks, the Human Trafficking Coalition, safe houses, donors and YWAM'S Media Village, all to raise awareness of the human trafficking crisis. I went to different schools and spoke to teachers and learners about human trafficking; I ran fundraising events in the form of art exhibitions; I worked with a group of ladies on the Cape Flats and I was invited to Parliament for the discussion sessions on the TIP Bill. I also attended the session when this Bill was accepted to be signed as law.

It was a very interesting time in my life. Because STOP was an NGO there was not a lot of money to pay me a market-related salary so I had to take on a 2nd and 3rd job to ensure there was enough in my bank to cover my expenses. I cooked and took care of a grandpa and grandson while the mom was in the UK doing care work. I also cooked

for an elderly gentleman and his wife who had Parkinson's disease. This was hectic and I could not keep all the balls in the air. The cost of living in Cape Town was very high.

I applied via Facebook for the position of receptionist at the Morgan Bay Hotel in the Eastern Cape. The packet included accommodation, food and laundry service. The hotel was just opposite the road from where I lived. By this time I was in a very bad financial situation but I was amazed by God's grace and provision. I have never in my life worked as hard as I worked at the reception at the Morgan Bay Hotel. Morgan Bay is an international and local family holiday destination. People who used to go there for holidays as little children, now come and bring their little kids for the

holidays. Apart from the normal holiday and weekend guests, the hotel is also a very popular wedding destination. In my second year at the Morgan Bay Hotel, the position of bookkeeper opened. I applied for the position and was successful. So, from 2014 I was the bookkeeper of the Morgan Bay Hotel. The logo for the Morgan Bay Hotel is "It is like coming home". Strange, at the YW it is "home away from home".

In June 2016 Noreen contacted me and asked if I would be interested to come and help out in Bloemfontein. At that stage I said no, because I was working and quite happy where I was. The owners (4th generation) of The Morgan Bay Hotel are lovely Christian people and one of the magazines that they subscribe to was the Joy. Every month the YW Bloemfontein advertisement jumped out at me, when I read the magazine. So, I said okay God, let's see what You want to do. When God got my full attention, things started to happen very, very quickly ... and here I am.

Way back in 1980, I had been given the opportunity to come and study at KOVSIES in Bloemfontein. I had a bursary and accommodation. Two weeks before I had to be in Bloemfontein for the course, I contacted them and said that I would rather stay in the Western Province. Throughout my life there has always been this little thought about what might have been different in my life if I had gone to Bloemfontein then, in 1981? What amazes me is that God opened a door again in Bloemfontein after all these years. When I find out why, I will let you know.

I attended Brother Angus Buchan's call to prayer in Bloemfontein earlier this year and was absolutely shocked when, amongst all the thousands of people there, I met up with Irene Visagie. Irene had been the Assistant Manager together with me when the East London YW house was sold in 2012 and we hadn't seen each other since as she had returned to her home in Piketberg in the Western Cape. God is soooo good!



I am Adelaide Mogweng from a small village called Gantatelang, Kuruman, in the Northern Cape. I am 21 years of age.

I have attended numerous schools in the Northern Cape, from Gantatelang to Lime Acres, from Lime Acres to Danielskuil, Kathu, and matriculated in Hotazel. Having to be raised by a single parent made things a bit challenging as I had to move to wherever Mom got work. However, I didn't grow up disadvantaged. When I was doing my grade 10 I had to choose subjects to 'major'" in and I took Maths and Science. That didn't go well and therefore I had to change my subjects.

I then moved to Hotazel where I took Art. This was my way of escaping the Science world. Juf Marthani was then my Visual Art teacher. It was challenging at first because I didn't find it as easy as I thought it would be. But time went by and it all became better. I was mostly very theoretically strong. 

In all this time I have come across different personalities, such as the inquisitive Grade 1 who wants to talk to everyone and ask everything all the time, and who will not let you help other kids because he really just wants to read another book to you. Or a moody Grade 3 who refuses to talk about their day - or anything, actually, especially how they lost a tooth at school that day. Or the scariest personality of all; the mid-pubescent Grade 6 who questions your credibility and who I have to constantly reassure that I did pass matric and I am qualified to help her with her Grade 6 homework. Honestly, through all these, and countless other personalities, through laughter, frustration and confusion, it has been fun and I feel blessed and fortunate to have watched these kids grow into these people who are full of happiness and potential and I cannot wait to see what blessings God has in store for them and what they will all become one day. those children.

As one of the business initiatives to finance and sustain the organisation, the farm has tunnels where various crops are grown. The task given to the volunteers on this particular day was to fill small bags with the growing medium for the next crop of jalepenos.

WHAT'S UP IN THE KITCHEN?

Six of our kitchens were upgraded in January of this year before the girls returned. MMbatho does not live in one of the Houses with an upgraded kitchen but she does have a nice stove and plenty of working space. Her passion is cooking, and that is the field she will work in once she has completed her degree. Mmbatho Molefe (3rd Year BA student)

When I entered "The Fresh Living Competition" I had no expectation of being selected, mainly because it was a national competition and there is a lot of talent in the country. The competition required that you send in a three course menu and the top ten would be selected for a cook-off competition in Cape Town. This would be a two hour "mystery basket" competition which meant that we would only find out our ingredients upon our arrival.

I emailed my menu and within two weeks learned that I had been selected as part of the top ten. Preparation for the event meant reading up on everything from sweet to savoury and I was deadset on making a risotto with whichever ingredients we were given. Luckily we got chicken, pastry, brie, pear and bacon and had to use a minimum of two ingredients.

I was the second to present my dish and was very nervous because I thought my risotto was too salty. I had prepared a rosemary risotto with pan fried chicken. It was intimidating to present my meal to food stylists, chefs and restauranteurs.

When the deliberations were done the winner of the R70 000.00 bursary was announced – I, unfortunately, was not that person. I came third and received a 10% discount on my fees if I were to register at "Sense of Taste Culinary School".

Before my sad departure I was approached by one of the chefs who gave me his number and said if I wanted to get kitchen experience I should call him. The first thing I did was to Google his name which is Harald Bresselschmidt, chef, patron and

owner of Aubergine Restaurant. During the end of year vac I spent 6 weeks working in his kitchen with his team of brilliant young chefs. I must say, as long as the hours were, I am going back!
