YW CONFERENCE 2015

By Margrit Temple - Nat. President As I prepared for Conference, and looking back I was freshly amazed at how God has been at work and how He has led us through various Seasons.

It is said that hindsight is an exact science, but I think that looking back is like a time-lapse film. Detail and the superfluous are removed as one looks at the essence of things. Our YW seasons do not run consequentially as in nature, nor do they have a particular time period, but on looking back we can recognise them.

We have had a dry season with regard to holding our National Conferences. Our last Conference was held in 2008, the following one was planned for 2011. There were two factors which resulted in our not holding them: firstly, there was no business to be discussed or transacted, and no proposed Resolutions or changes; secondly, at the time the National Office had large outstanding loans held by two Local Associations and we could simply not justify spending on a Conference which had no business at hand.

Subsequent to that, a new Companies Act was implemented by the Government which impacted on our YW Constitution, now called a Memorandum of Incorporation (MOI), which necessitated changes. While this process was underway we felt that our YW Constitution, which was drawn up in 1929, should be updated to become a more manageable, understandable and workable document. Much else happened during this process to slow us down, but God has His time within a Season (just as Spring produces little shoots and buds before blossoms and full leaf) so we have been able in this process to formulate a Trust which is not at odds with the our proposed new YW Constitution (MOI). In the interim however, Manager's Get-togethers were held to discuss matters of common concern and maintain connectivity. results were devastating. Three of the Houses had loans from the National office which they were struggling to repay and the Houses were in dire need of repairs and renovation.

Our AUTUMN started in January 2011 with a new Manager in Cape Town who, by April, had been found to be guilty of theft and was dismissed. A second Manager was appointed in June but the conditions in the house remained problematic. In February we were shattered by the Manager and Property Manager in Pietermaritzburg absconding, having committed fraud and theft and leaving the administration in the office in a shambles. We felt we were putting out Autumn fires; simultaneously, the Rates problem with the Bloemfontein Municipality was escalating and then, in August it was discovered that the maintenance person in the Johannesburg House had also committed fraud. In all three cases substantial amounts were involved. The following year theft was discovered in the Pretoria house and the Manager dismissed immediately.

Early in 2012 we had reached a watershed situation, now four of the six Houses had loans made up of various large outstanding amounts. East London was bankrupt and Johannesburg would be there by 2014. We were experiencing WINTER which was dark and daunting. Committees were ageing and shrinking; Municipalities impossible to work with; demographics worsening, and difficulty was also being experienced in ministering to the Residents. A Confidential Report was tabled at the Executive held on 29 March 2012 and a decision was taken that Noreen and I

In 2009 we became concerned about our Managers and their Assistants who had no pension provisions as The YW did not have a pension scheme. A Retirement Annuity for each person concerned was purchased in their name.

In 2010 the National Office became very disturbed about the deteriorating condition of our buildings which was becoming an increasing problem. A Building Surveyor was employed to assess each of the six houses and the

would visit each Local Association on the occasion of their AGM in May and have a special meeting with their Trustees, Committee members and Staff afterwards.

> Each Local Association was asked to once again evaluate their viability and future. By the end of that month the Johannesburg Local Association Committee had resolved to sell and it was not long before the East London Committee took the same decision.

Contrary to all expectations and with virtually no marketing, the Johannesburg House was sold by the end of September and the East London House by the end of December the same year. The Pretoria house was sold a year later with all resident's contracts having expired.

I cannot go into all the detail of each miracle but it was a season of trauma, retrenchments, sadness and a great sense of loss. The Committee members involved still ask whether the right thing was done and time and again conclude that it was. God sold each house separately and uniquely against all odds. The loans made by Johannesburg and East London YW's were repaid to the National office out of the proceeds from the sale of their properties. The bulk of those monies were securely invested in a Coronation Strategic Income Fund, which is separate to the funds of the National office.

The confidential report mentioned earlier became a letter sent to every person connected to The YW (dd. 20 August 2012). This outlined the situation in the Houses, the Outlook, the Prospects and the Proposal that we need to "re-invent" the way The YW could minister to young women in the future where a residence no longer exists.

During 2013 many long and heated debates for and against establishing a Trust or Foundation with the monies invested took place. By May the sale of the Johannesburg and East London houses had been finalised and in July a further decision was taken to write off the outstanding loans to the National office of Bloemfontein and Pietermaritzburg YW's, thus stabilising these two Local Associations.

The non-co-operation of the Mangaung/Bloemfontein Municipality continued and the two cases of fraud being handled by lawyers trundled along with the culprits evading every effort of locating them. It was seemingly a dormant year with much frustration and little forward movement. Dormancy is often necessary for anticipated growth.

February 2014 brought with it SPRING. Consensus was reached regarding the way forward with the investment from the sale of the three houses:

a) A Trust would be created for the ongoing Christian evangelical work among young women in all our Local Associations;

b) The capital would be preserved for long term use in promoting God's work, and

c) The whole structure of The YW would be reviewed.

It was a season of growth in preparation for the future in our fastchanging social society. Our Vision and Mission Statement were updated. The Trust Deed was drawn up. Our MOI was updated to improve the structure and management of the Organisation with a draft being tabled in April this year. In conclusion, we know that God is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow throughout all our seasons. We also know that He is always at work, which means change takes place. While our first responsibility remains towards the existing Local Associations, the vision is to partner with groups who hold to the same values, objectives and vision as ours to bring the Gospel to a wider spectrum of young women than we are able to do. These will be partners in the Gospel who reach into places where we cannot. We believe, through the many events that have taken place within The YW, God has been leading us into yet another Season.

May it be a SUMMER season of growth through our being able to plant in a larger field with more workers who are younger, and that this new thrust may yield a very fruitful harvest for His Kingdom among young women who still remain our focus!

After our Conference, an explanation of the decisions made are:-

THE YW TRUST

Which of us, if we received a large sum of money (a bequest for example) would not get information from our bank manager or accountant regarding how best to invest these monies for the benefit of our whole family? That is exactly what was done by our Directors who spoke to both our (National) auditors and attorneys to ensure that what we proposed to Executive was correct. The thinking behind all our actions has been to be good stewards of what God has placed in our care. When the East London, Johannesburg and Pretoria houses were sold and those monies were directed to National for safekeeping, those Local Association Committees requested that part of those monies be used within the region they had been operational in.

All of us are getting older. Within 10yrs very few of us who are currently working for The YW will still be here. Had we chosen to split the house sale proceeds between National Office and the Local Associations, who can guarantee that at some time we wouldn't have a Staff member/s who could be tempted to embezzle large sums. We want to ensure that these monies are available for all our current houses to cover large maintenance needs, building of house extensions, or to erect a new house should that opportunity arise, as well as to assist in supporting Christian organisations already operating within the colleges and/or universities in the areas where our YW houses no longer operate. We have to be good stewards for everyone in our YW family. Our current houses are our main concern, and always have been.

Should an opportunity arise that would open the way for us to build/establish a new house and Local Association, Executive would be supportive of that. However, we cannot build a YW house that is not within close proximity to a university and colleges as our residents have become young university and/or college students whereas in previous years (i.e. prior to the turn of this century) they were young women coming into the cities for employment purposes and our YW houses then needed to be situated near the city's centre, which is not always near the learning centres.

OUR YW CONSTITUTION / MOI (Memorandum of Incorporation)

This is a document which all companies have to have in accordance with the South African Company Act – the same is with the need for company Directors (Office Bearers – old terminology) and not one of us sitting in these positions, either at National Head Office or in the Local Associations as Managers and Presidents, have put themselves there – only God.

At our National Conference the final concluding agreement concerning our MOI is that we would work with the one which was decided on at Conference for the next 12 months. During that period each Local Association (i.e. management and Committee) will analyse what aspects of the MOI are not easy to understand or where we can improve upon the way we action various things, etc. Those deliberations will be set down in the Local Association Committee meeting Minutes and forwarded to National Office and a discussion will be held to finalise the whole document next May (2016) for submitting to the Company Registrar.

I trust that this has helped each of you to understand that our hearts (i.e. National Head Office) has not changed from the original "call" of The YW: to bring the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to every young woman God places in our care and to encourage her to enter into His Kingdom by believing in Jesus' death and resurrection for each of us. We have and are fulfilling this calling through the ministry within our houses, but in those areas where no house is operating we must investigate other ways in which to accomplish this task.
